From the Desk of Fr. Angelo



Christmas, unlike other Christian holidays, gives us a unique opportunity to view both our Orthodox and American lifestyles, a clash of culture if you will. Here in America in an effort to maintain our political correctness we replace "Merry Christmas" with greetings of "Happy Holidays". Starting with Coca-Cola's metamorphosis of St. Nicholas into Jolly Old Santa Claus and ending with the question of whether there even was such an event as the Immaculate Birth of the Son of God, Christmas in American has become an almost totally secular affair with the

focus on parties, giving and receiving of presents, stressful shopping, etc. In fact, it's not even fair to say that Christmas has become *Pagan* since the Yule time for Pagans was very religious. Prior to and through the early Christian centuries, winter festivals — especially those centered on the winter solstice — were the most popular of the year in many European Pagan cultures. Many of our modern Christmas customs have their roots in Pagan ancient traditions such as the Celtic winter herbs; mistletoe and ivy, and kissing under a mistletoe, the Germanic Yule Log, the Norse god Odin as the "Yule Father" and Ancient Roman decorations of greenery and lights.

Now, of course, this is not to say that everyone celebrates the Feast of Christmas, however, we, as Christians, need to recover the original meaning behind this Feast. Historically, the Feast of Christmas was unknown to the early Christian writers, prior to the early part of the 4th century. The early Fathers of the Church such as Irenaeus and Tertullian did not even have Christmas on their list of feasts. The earliest known Christmas celebration is recorded in a 4th century manuscript by a Roman aristocrat. In the Orthodox lands, the birth of Jesus was celebrated in connection with the Epiphany on January 6, showing that the emphasis was more on the celebration of Christ's baptism. Christmas was promoted in the Christian East as part of the revival of Nicene Christianity and the Feast of Christmas was introduced at Constantinople by St. John Chrysostom towards the end of the fourth century, probably around 381.

As to the date of Christmas being December 25th, the two most prevalent ideas are a) that this date was chosen to coincide with the pagan Winter Solstice celebrations and therefore begin the conversion of pagans to Christianity; or b) the date was selected to coincide with the 9-month period of pregnancy following the Annunciation event of March 25th.

But for us as Orthodox, the Feast of Christmas is much more than a historical event or a time to share memories with family and friends. The Feast of Christmas heralds in the beginning of our salvation. In his Christmas Day homily, St. John Chrysostom expresses this beautifully:

The Ancient of days has become an infant. He who sits upon the sublime and heavenly Throne, now lies in a manger. And he who cannot be touched, who is simple, without complexity, and incorporeal, now lies subject to the hands of men. He who has broken the bonds of sinners, is now bound by an infant's bands. But he has decreed that ignominy shall become honor, infamy be clothed with glory and total humiliation the measure of his Goodness.

For this he assumed my body, that I may become capable of his Word, taking my flesh, he gives me his spirit so he bestowing and I receiving, He prepares for me the treasure of Life. He takes my flesh, to sanctify me, he gives me his Spirit, that he may save me.


In this [Christmas] feast the feasts of Epiphany, Holy Pascha, the Ascension and Pentecost have their beginning and their purpose. For if Christ had not been born according to the flesh, he would not have been baptized, which is Epiphany. He would not have been crucified, which is Pascha. He would not have sent the Holy Spirit, which is Pentecost. So from this event, as from some spring, different rivers flow - these feasts of ours are born.

Come, then, let us observe the Feast. Truly wondrous is the whole chronicle of the Nativity. For this day the ancient slavery is ended, the devil confounded, the demons take to flight, the power of death is broken.

So during this Great Feast of Christmas let us all reacquaint ourselves with the true meaning and importance of this period. Christ is born! Glorify the newborn King!



The Office of Ionian Village announced today the dates for its Summer 2019 programs. Ionian Village is the international camping ministry of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America with campgrounds located in Peloponnesus, Greece.

The mission of Ionian Village is to enrich the lives of its participants by bringing campers and staff into close contact with their Orthodox faith and Hellenic heritage by providing the opportunity for young people of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America to foster a life-long appreciation and love of Greece, Orthodoxy, and Hellenism.

IV Next

Dozens of colleges and universities offer study abroad programs in Greece, and many programs of our own diaspora offer similar opportunities for

young adults to travel to Greece and see the sights. However, IV Next is the only travel-based program for young adults that has our Greek Orthodox faith as a core tenet of the program. Only IV Next combines professional development, international travel, and the Orthodox Faith into one all-inclusive program. IV Next is for participants ages 19-24 and will run from June 2-13, 2019.

Summer Camp

The picturesque Ionian Village campgrounds sit along the shores of the pristine Ionian Sea and are equipped with a private beach, a renovated Olympic-sized pool, air-conditioned cabins, and various athletic courts and fields. Campers actively explore their Orthodox faith and heritage, both through the daily at-camp program and through excursions to culturally and religiously significant sites throughout Greece. Excursions include Ancient Olympia, Patras, Zakynthos, Kefalonia, Kalavrita, Aegina, and Athens. Each 20-day session is open to young people who will have completed grades 9 through 12.
